FOUR SAINTSMEN NAMED HISPANIC SCHOLARS

This year, Saints has four National Hispanic Scholars. They are, Carlos Orendain, Brennan Amsberry, Juan Lara, and Christopher Guadarrama, all seniors.

The National Hispanic Recognition
Program is based on the students scoring
among the top 2.5% of Hispanic and Latino
students in the region on the PSAT-NMSQT
test which is taken in the junior year.

These students also needed grade point averages of a 3.0 or higher.

The College Board, to identify outstanding Hispanic high school students and to share information about these academically well-prepared students with subscribing colleges and universities, initiated national Hispanic Recognition Program (NHRP) in 1983.



A student is one who is:

ATTENTIVE AND WILLING

God does not give you a mark on your talents, but on your willingness. If God knows that you wanted to do something but were unable to, he marks you just as if you had done it. That you have done what you were able to, although you may have failed to achieve what you wanted, counts in your favor; that you tried to do something and you were not able to, counts as if you had done so. (Sermon 18,5)

Do what you can. God asks no more. (Sermon 128,10,12) There are some that, although they don't sleep, doze. They don't give themselves over completely to sleep but they abandon their eyelids to sleepiness and, as they become drowsy, they nod. Instead of taking the reins of their life, they are taken without direction by her. Wake up and be alert! (Commentary on the Psalms, 131,8)

Scholars names are posted on a national list, which is circulated to all colleges and universities nation-wide. Colleges are then able to contact students regarding recruitment and scholarship possibilities. Many colleges use this

status to offer full tuition scholarships. In other cases, the designation is seen as making admissions candidates more competitive. Saints has had National Hispanic Scholars annually. For more information visit www.collegeboard.org/nhrp

In order to be eligible, students must be at least one-quarter Hispanic. Each year the NHRP identifies approximately 5,000 of the highest scoring students from a nationwide total of 250,000 high school juniors who took the PSAT/NMSQT and designated themselves as Hispanic as well as approximately 200 of the top scoring PAA students from Puerto Rico. The nationwide selection also includes students from Puerto Rico, U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, and U.S. citizens attending international and APO schools.


BENEFITS

Although the College Board is not able to provide a monetary award to these students, an important component of the program is the CD-ROM distributed to subscribing four-year postsecondary institutions. This CD-ROM lists the names of all students selected in the program and is mailed in September to these subscribing colleges and universities. Being listed as a National Hispanic Scholar may give students an opportunity to hear from colleges that are particularly interested in communicating with prospective students of Hispanic heritage.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Qualification for recognition is based on the student's combined verbal, math, and writing skill scores on the PSAT/NMSQT taken in the student's junior year of high school. PSAT score cut-offs vary each year by state, but typically range in the high 180s/low 190s. Students must also self-identify themselves as Hispanic on the PSAT/NMSQT. A minimum grade point average is established for the program and this academic information is requested directly from the high schools.

To qualify for this program, you must be at least one-quarter Hispanic/Latino. Hispanic/Latino is an ethnic category, not a racial category, and you may be of any race. For purposes of the NHRP, you must be from a family whose ancestors came from at least one of these countries: Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Spain, Uruguay, or Venezuela.



Faculty member Mrs. Marie-Line Allen and a group of 30 Saintsmen attended the recent 2016 Youth Town Meeting at the University of San Diego. The 19th annual conference focused on the influence of youth over our world: for better or worse. It was held at USD's Joan B. Kroc Institute for Peace and Justice.

Saintsmen unanimously applauded the content of the day and came back to campus with a strengthened resolve to make a positive impact on their local and global communities.

This year, more than 800 high school students from San Diego and Baja California attend this youth conference, where they discuss important global topics with leading experts from public and private organizations.

YTMs are grounded in the belief that youth have much to offer and much to gain from discussion with experts and professionals regarding the complexities and challenges of international affairs.

Conference programming zeroed in on the positive and negative impact that youth can have on social, economic, environmental, policy and technology-based issues. Subjects such as girls' access to education, gun violence, poverty, water, sexual violence gave students an invitation to examine global issues openly, hear from speakers who spoke of their challenges and actions

that have been successful. Through their participation, students at the YTM can be inspired to be changemakers, too.

"WorldLink really exists as a way for them to tackle a lot of real issues and have them at the discussion, decision-making and problem-solving table," said Debbie Martinez, a senior IPJ program officer at USD and the director of USD's WorldLink Program. "They get to explore what this all means for them. Maybe they want to pursue business and connect to peacebuilding or connect art and peacebuilding. It's really an opportunity for them to explore how they can make that little step, make their imprint in the world."

The YTM is a student-run event. They serve as moderators, journalists, photographers and many presenters were energetic and impactful difference makers who aren't far removed age wise from their audience.

Alaa Basatneh, a Syria native who as a 19-year-old college student in Illinois, was able to mobilize a Syrian revolution from her Chicago bedroom with social media tools that helped smaller protest groups connect into a larger force. Her story was captured in the award-winning documentary, #ChicagoGirl. Basatneh's talk Wednesday included film clips and she encouraged students to share issues they have a passion for and what they're doing about it.

Erica Ales and Joyce Im work on campaigns connected to Malala Yousafzai

of Pakistan, a teenager who has become a global inspiration and a vocal leader for girls' education access. A co-recipient of the 2014 Nobel Prize, Yousafzai's work has inspired creation of the Malala Fund, which is dedicated to giving girls the opportunity to complete 12 years of safe, quality education. A documentary, "He Named Me Malala," was released in 2015. Ales said more than 60 million girls are denied access to education. Im, who is an educational outreach associate for the Students Stand With Malala, had students work in small groups to create a short digital art video by recording their voices to recite lines from the Malala Fund anthem, "Words on Fire."

YTM Diector Martinez said she's proud of WorldLink and the chance to work with young people in a college setting like USD, which has an innovative campus atmosphere, takes pride in building emerging leaders and hosts an event where the next generation can learn about avenues to build peace and build a better future.

"Today, we're 800 strong, and from here, these students will take what they've learned and it will trickle into their communities," Martinez said.

COMMITTED AND STUDIOUS

God made you without you. You didn't, after all, give any consent to God making you. How were you to consent, if you didn't yet exist? So while God made you without your help, God does not save you without your help. (Sermon 169,11,13)


God is everywhere. Therefore, if you don't' fall away from God, God will not move away from you. (Treatise on St. John's Gospel, 34,6)

dents in a small school adjacent to the camp called Al Zarak. The students at the school included refugees from Syria and the poor. youth from the neighboring towns in Jordan.

When asked about his time working at the UNICEF camps, Mo said, "It was a great experience, and seeing the daily life of those in the camp made me extremely grateful for the opportunities I have been given"

Mo's story reflects the 94-year-old school's tradition of faith-based education. Education and caring for one another (no matter what denomination the student happens to be) are just two of the basic tenets of the school's Augustinian Order leadership.

"Although they are not singled out," says Principal James Horne, "the school has regularly welcomed students of Muslim and Jewish (and other faiths) backgrounds to its halls over the years. What really matters is God and getting a solid education."


