
Proving good things come to those who wait; young William da Luz caught the last fish of the day. He and dad, Carlos da Luz ('83), were able to spend some quality time at sea.

Alums readily acknowledge that of all the weeks on campus few are more fondly remembered than Freshman Welcome Week.


Despite the pandemic, this year is no different.



It always comes up in my phone conversation with the parents how much their freshman son loves coming to Saints. And while I have never done any research to discover the secret sauce, I have come to the conclusion, that 14-year old boys love Saints due to the manner in which their teachers engage them. They are treated with respect, there is male humor in the class, and boys do not mind the risk of being wrong when volunteering an answer to a question in an all-male classroom.

To be treated as an equal by one's teacher is an exciting proposition when most of our boys come from parochial schools that are small and dominated by women teachers who tend to want them to act like girls. Although these very same boys when they first step on Saints campus, while at first scary, become a breath of fresh air. They quickly find out their senior big brother is really not trying to kill them and they begin to see the brotherhood in operation.

On Friday, March 13, 2020, at the conclusion of what was going to be Grandparents Day Mass, Mr. Horne, Fr. Max and Mr. O'Beirne announced that school would not resume on Monday for in-person learning, but would move to an online format. Anyone observing the announcement would have thought summer vacation had just been announced 10 weeks early. There was elation in the air. One could feel the energy as the boys surged out of the Commons. Little did they know that would be the last day of class on campus for the next five months. They also did not know that in only a very short period of time, they would miss Saints and give anything to return to campus.

Saints, which has historically hung its hat on teacher/student relationships, would provide education remotely, virtually online for the next 10 weeks. Although very few instructors had experience with this new medium, the overwhelming response from parents was a thumbs-up during those troubling first weeks of the crisis.

Even weekly student Mass was held virtually and the administration was left to create videos to communicate important messages, ideas and events to the community as time went on. For ten weeks, St. Augustine

High School was eerily quiet. There were not the normal sounds of students in Tolle Lege Plaza or on the rooftop of the Commons playing basketball or any of Mr. Go's numerous lunchtime activities. It all had died! There were just a few teachers and a skeleton group of administrators and staff who worked in isolation in their offices.

What made Saints great was now nonexistent. Friendship and great relationships are hard to come by when students and teachers cannot meet face-to-face. With classes beginning online on Tuesday, August 25, 2020, Saints began in this sterile environment of virtual learning. Teachers were in their classrooms, administrators in their offices, but not a sound from a Saintsman could be heard. Although the buildings are nice, they were meant to be filled.

With the COVID-19 infection rate in decline, high school hybrid education opened on September 1 in the County of San Diego, which meant schools could open if they were able to socially distance and abide by all the protocols. As a result, the seniors and juniors had their orientation for the new hybrid system that was unveiled on September 3 for a September 8 start date.

During the orientation, it was clear from the beginning that the seniors and juniors were fired up to be back at Saints. Although I had heard from several parents that their sons were dying to come back to school, it was evident that these students were ecstatic about resuming their Saints Experience. For all of these boys who knew how their high school education used to be, they knew, even in a hybrid form, Saints was the place to be. For boys who were so happy to have a shortened school year just a few months before had discovered that school at Saints is second to none and their happiness resided in their friendships with their brothers.

From my office, I heard the familiar blare of music from Mr. Osberg's classroom that had not been heard for months and watched teachers and coaches interplay with the boys on campus. It was impossible not to notice the smiles on everyone's faces.

I wish everyone the best as we forge ahead in the uncertainty of the 2020-2021 academic year!


HALO JOE'S COVID HOURS

I first stepped onto the campus of St. Augustine High School in August 2010 when I travelled from Britain for a pastoral year. Throughout the months I was there I was so warmly welcomed into the community and loved to engage with the many areas of school life: jazz band, ping pong, rowing intersession, subbing, mass band, Spain World Youth Day 2011... It was a year where I was surprised by joy and Saints found a place in my heart.

Having been an Augustinian since 2005 in the British Province I returned to San Diego in 2014, this time as a member of the St. Augustine Province of California, and took up a position teaching Sophomore Religion and running the Skills for Life Intersession. It was also a time to develop myself professionally and I attended the University of San Francisco to embark on a Masters in Catholic Educational Leadership.
