Anyone watching the TV through the pandemic, the summer of unrest and the recent elections knows that times are tumultuous. And the uncertainty surrounding it all leads to some of life's bigger questions Questions like, "How can we mend a broken world?"

We may not have the answer, but that won't keep us from asking the questions.

To do that Saints is launching a new endeavor known as the **Veritas Forum** which invites students and faculty to ask life's difficult questions. With a commitment to courageous discourse, we will put the Gospel message and our Catholic faith in dialogue with other beliefs and invite participants from all backgrounds to pursue Truth together. What they told us surprised us: there were no horror stories, and issues that did pop up, the boys said were well handled by the administration. They did point out one important thing: excessive and over the top "jokes" told through the means of racial and cultural stereotypes. These "jokes" we found, often told through the developing comedic "skills" of the teenage mind, affected many of our students. They also strike at many of the groups that makes Saints the wonderful and diverse community that it is.

In the spirit of St. Augustine, we will use our first Veritas Forum to share personal experiences so that we can acknowledge, heal, and unite with common purpose. We look forward to a forum guided and led by the Holy Spirit.

Possible future topics for the Veritas
Forum include, the pitfalls of social media, the
temptations of drugs and alcohol, dating and
positive relationships, driving and responsible
decision making.



Let's Discuss Following Your Teen's Social Media

Instagram, Snapchat, YouTube and TikTok ... They are the way the youth of today communicate. And despite the frequency of inappropriate pictures and graphic language these hugely popular sites are the new norm in the world of teen social culture. These sites combine just about every new technology that kids love and parents distrust—instant messaging, blogging, chat rooms, music and video downloads and more.

Social Media sites are part of the social scene at schools everywhere. The online social-networking craze has now hit younger kids—down to age 9 or 10. Nonexistent just about a decade and a half ago, these sites now boast having hundreds of millions of users.

We know that teen communication is all about social relationships and it isn't all that surprising that this communication has now moved online. After all, kids have always wanted to hang out and not tell their parents what they're doing. But because of the proliferation of profane language, references to drugs and alcohol, and obscene photos and commentary, we think parents should be aware.

Saints does not want to prejudice anyone against the appropriate use of sites like instagram, pheed, shapchat, tumblr, vine, and others. It's just that so much of what is posted and available on these sites is clearly crossing the line.

Take an active role, talk with your Saintsman about privacy, posting and knowing what is appropriate. And by all means, follow your students' social media.

Intersession Falls Victim to Covid-19

Saints has had to make many schedule changes in order to accommodate all the students during the coronavirus pandemic. Instead of having six classes every day, there are

only three. The school is entirely online most Mondays. Mass is celebrated twice per week: once for the freshmen and sophomores and once for the juniors and seniors. Perhaps most obvious is the cohort system which all students have experienced.

There are more changes on the horizon, including changes to finals, Christmas break, and Intersession.

Ordinarily, during finals week, all students take their exams for the same classes at the same time: English and religion on one day, math and history on another day, and science and foreign language on the third, with each test taking an hour and a half.

"Because of COVID restrictions, we couldn't do that this year," Mr. Hecht said.

Instead, students will take their block 1 and 2 finals the first day, blocks 3 and 4 the second day, and blocks 5 and 6 the third day. Additionally, the tests will be only an hour long so as to accommodate the classes that are split in half.

The most notable upcoming schedule change, however, is the cancellation of Intersession.

"Unfortunately, we had to make the very difficult decision to put it on hiatus," Mr. Hecht said. "It was sad to have to make that decision, because it's so endearing for us and we feel for the students, we understand how inviting and exciting Intersession is, so it was heartbreaking for all the administrators."

The decision to cancel Intersession was necessary due to COVID restrictions which started to snowball and cause a

"logistical nightmare," as Mr. Hecht put it. One important reason was that many places where seniors normally would take internships were unable to do so this year because of restrictions, causing what Mr. Hecht called a "slow erosion" of places where seniors would be able to go. Many workplaces were online only and those that weren't were unable to bring Saintsmen on for a month, so many seniors would have nowhere to go.

Many other Intersession classes were simply unable to comply with COVID restrictions, such as cooking class.

"Can we put 50 kids together with food? No, that's prohibited," Mr. Hecht said. "We started to realize that we were looking at half the student population having nowhere to go for Intersession."

He also added that speech classes, which usually have 20-25 students per class, would have to be split into cohorts, adding more students to the total. And with regard to the Intersession Expo? "There's no way we could host that under the current restrictions," Hecht said.

So what will take the place of Intersession? Although Mr. Hecht joked that Christmas break would be extended to March, Christmas break will actually be extended by one week, beginning after final exams on December 17 and ending on January 11. The second semester will then begin three weeks earlier than normal, giving teachers the ability to fill in gaps from the first semester and move at a slightly slower pace in the second semester.

As for speech class, English teachers will be teaching speech in the first three weeks of the new semester. "It's important to have on their transcript, so we need to get that instruction in," said Mr. Hecht.

The schedule changes disrupt the usual way of life at Saints, but it's all for the safety of the Saints community and the school looks forward to the return of Intersession in 2022.

will meet with a member of the counseling staff to review their academic transcript and input their requests for next school year. In order to request courses, students must have (on their person at the time of their meeting with a counselor) a completed course request form that is signed by a parent or guardian as well as a completed and signed Advanced Placement contract if applicable.

Students will request their courses according to the following schedule:

Current freshmen (Class of 2024) – Thursday and Friday, January 28 and January 29, during their English course.

Current juniors (Class of 2022) – Wednesday and Thursday, February 3 and 4, during their religion course.


Seniors Dominate New Turkey Trot Relays

Yes, We Will Be Driving to School Again...Sometime.

Parents who drive to campus and in the neighborhoods near school can play an important role in enhancing safety near Saints by following safe driving practices. They also can help Saints be a good neighbor in our community. When we return to School please pay attention to the helpful tips below.

Dropping your son off away from school and allowing him to walk a few blocks will prevent large gathering at entrances. Have a designated pick up spot where your student can meet you after school while social distancing himself from others. This will help prevent student gathering in crowds as they arrive and leave school. You have healthy young men who can walk a short distance to and from campus.

- Avoid double parking
- Only travel on the right side of the street

- Use the turnouts and avoid stopping on streets immediately surrounding school (32nd, 33rd, Nutmeg and Palm)
- Do not block driveways
- Make no U-Turns on Nutmeg St.
- Drive slowly in the neighborhood 25 mph, and even slower at drop-off (7:30 am) and pick -up (2:00 pm) times.
- Slow down and obey all traffic laws and speed limits, in neighborhoods surrounding the school.
- Watch for students walking or bicycling (both on the road and the sidewalk) in areas near a school.
- If you are on campus for an after school or evening event please park in the lower parking lot to allow neighbors to park in front of their houses.

Happy Birthday, St. Augustine

St. Augustine, also called Saint Augustine of Hippo, original Latin name Aurelius Augustinus, (born November 13, 354, Tagaste, Numidia [now Souk Ahras, Algeria]—died August 28, 430, Hippo Regius [now Annaba, Algeria]; feast day August 28), bishop of Hippo from 396 to 430, one of the Latin Fathers of the Church and perhaps the most significant Christian thinker after St. Paul. Augustine's adaptation of classical thought to Christian teaching created a theological system of great power and lasting influence.

His numerous written works, the most important of which are Confessions (c. 400) and The City of God (c. 413–426), shaped the practice of biblical exegesis and helped lay the foundation for much of medieval and modern Christian thought. In Roman Catholicism he is formally recognized as a doctor of the church.

Engineering a Pinhole Camera By Mr. Chris Freestone, Saints Faculty

The Intro to Engineering class, born this summer out of a partnership with the University of Texas at Austin, recently finished its first project. The students were tasked with creating a pinhole camera that would be operable by someone who had a disability in their hands.


Project had to be operable by a user wearing oven mitts to simulate the scenario. Students were required to create the camera from materials such as carboard boxes, magnets, balsa wood, and an aluminum square for the aperture. The students learned how to calculate focal length and exposure time for their camera to properly capture their subject.

Once they had built their camera to the proper specifications and ensured that it was usable by someone with a hand disability, they took their cameras outside, exposed their film, and then developed their photos in a darkroom.





county was steady and deadly. As the weeks dissolved into months and graduations across the state became unique experiences for schools and their graduates, planning for a hybrid model in the fall was well underway.

With summer came the possibility of inperson Summer School. Given the county's emerging protocols for reducing the spread of the virus, our administrative team felt a small summer school session could be controlled and with proper discipline, a more normal educational experience could be created for our young men that would be safe and effective for our students and teachers.

Feedback from our teachers following their experience in late spring informed us that our boys were suffering from social isolation and their focus for learning while good was not optimal. Through the years, and from the teaching of St. Augustine, we knew the secret sauce of our educational mission resided in strong relationships fostered between our teachers and students.

The successful completion of summer school helped us prepare for what we thought would be a hybrid system of education in the fall for our 700 students. With planning and using the County Health Department guidelines, we had confidence the risk of the spread of infection would be greatly minimized.

Given the government's decision in mid-July to force all secondary schools to operate online in September, both our Board of Directors and administration, along with a large percentage of the faculty felt strongly that we needed to be in a hybrid system of education. With a successful summer school under our belt, the administration felt a healthy environment could be created that was far superior to online learning.

To balance health concerns with the fallout of learning and mental health issues, our priority and mission was to begin *hybrid* education just after the school year began. What have we learned? For the first nine weeks of having all 700 boys meeting at Saints four days a week has thus far demonstrated that our school can proceed with adherence to county protocols.

A safe environment with minimum infections and at this point no spread has been created. All the infections, like what occurred during summer school, came about from close contact at family parties on weekends. The best news relates to our students' happiness and a more optimum learning environment that has been provided.


While CIF competition has been delayed until January 8, 2021, the boys continue to train and work towards preparing for their sports seasons. Their associations


once again on campus have made a great difference to their sense of well-being. While life is not normal, their best days are Tuesday through Friday when they are in their cohorts at school—together. The mothers and fathers of our students also know the important difference this has made for their sons by creating a more positive outlook towards life and their future.

Although we do not have a crystal ball and don't know what the future will bring, we do know we have each other in friendship, a better sense of well-being and healthy outlook about the future. The risk in which we live is real and is not underestimated. Covid-19 can be extremely dangerous as we have witnessed through the news.

Our efforts to live out our lives in community in these precarious times have borne fruit and our moms and dads know the full value of our attempt to meet our boys on campus as mentors, teachers, and coaches.

We ask God to continue to watch over us all and protect us as we attempt to find imaginative ways to live in a more complicated world.
