
enriching our lives and reimagining our future opportunities.

Rev. Harry Neely O.S.A. [1928-2020]

A Good Man Goes to Heaven

It is with no small blend of sadness mixed with gratitude and joy that the Augustinian Province of St. Augustine in California announces the death of our brother, Fr. Harry Neely O.S.A. After a year of declining health "Fr. Harry" died in his room at Nazareth House in San Diego on December 16, 2020.

Fr. Harry was born in San Diego, California on May 23, 1928 to Marguerite (Moriarity) and Harry Neely. Fr. Harry is predeceased by his parents and Alice Thayer, his only sister. He attended Our Lady of Angels School in San Diego, and he graduated from St. Augustine High School in 1945. Upon completion from high school, he entered the seminary at Augustinian Academy in Staten Island, New York. He professed vows as a religious in 1947, after completing the Augustinian novitiate year in New Hamburg, New York. He attended college at St. Mary's Hall in Villanova, Pennsylvania, graduating in 1950, and professed solemn vows that same year. Harry studied theology at Augustinian College in Washington, D.C., where he was ordained a deacon. He was ordained a priest at St. Joseph's Cathedral in San Diego on December 21, 1953 by Bishop Charles F. Buddy.

In his lengthy priesthood, Fr. Harry served well in parish ministry (St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Ojai (1976-1987,) formation ministry in Camarillo, California (1971-73,) as a student attaining a Master of Arts in Fundamental Catholic Spirituality from Duquesne University (1973-76), but most notably as a teacher and religious presence at various Catholic high schools: Archbishop Carroll in Washington DC [1954-57,] Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana California [1966-69,] Central Catholic in Modesto [1969-71,] Villanova Prep School in Ojai [2004-2008,] and three separate periods of time at St. Augustine High School, totaling twenty-one years. Fr. Neely lived in the St. Augustine monastery community for the last twelve years. A few months ago, he became a resident at Nazareth House in San Diego.

Fr. Harry was known for his outstanding singing voice, his charm, wit, and delight in engaging in conversation. He was very much a Latin scholar. For a number of years, he celebrated the Latin mass on Sundays at the chapel of Holy Cross Mausoleum in San Diego. When he no longer had personal mobility, he loved reading and delighting frequent visitors with his razor-sharp intelligence. With all his gifts, however, Fr. Harry will be remembered by many as the holiest person they ever encountered. People travelled many miles just to have him hear their confession. His love of life wasn't just buoyed by the presence of others in which he found great joy—but in the happiness he experienced in knowing and serving the Lord. His last public action, just before he died, was to respond to someone who told him that now he was going to get his reward in heaven. He feebly made the sign of the cross and whispered, "thanks be to God!"

A mass for Fr. Harry Neely OSA will be celebrated at St. Patrick's Church in San Diego (3585 30th St.) on Monday morning, December 21st at 11:00. This day marks the 67th year anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. The mass will be preceded by the recitation of the rosary at the same church at 10:30. At the conclusion of the funeral liturgy, he will be buried at the Augustinian plot at Holy Cross Cemetery in San Diego.

Please remember in your prayers Fr. Neely, the Augustinian family, his nieces and nephews, his former students and parishioners, and the residents and staff of the Nazareth House Assisted Living Facility.

Time to Sign Up for New Courses

As we turn the calendar, it is time to begin the process of requesting courses for the 2021-2022 school year. All the information regarding this process, as well as the 2021-22 Curriculum Guide and course selection

presentation, is now available on the front and academic pages of the St. Augustine website (www.sahs.org). Please utilize these materials to assist you and your son in completing the course request forms.

These forms will be distributed to the current freshmen in their English courses and the current sophomores and juniors can pick them up from Mrs. Oliwa in the Registrar's office. The forms can also be found on the front and academic pages of the St. Augustine website (www.sahs.org).

On their designated day, each student will meet with a member of the counseling

staff to review their academic transcript and input their requests for next school year. In order to request courses, students must have (on their person at the time of their meeting with a counselor) a completed course request form that is signed by a parent or guardian as well as a completed and signed Advanced Placement contract if applicable.

Students will request their courses according to the following schedule:

Current freshmen (Class of 2024) – Thursday and Friday, January 28 and January 29, during their English course.

Current juniors (Class of 2022) – Wednesday and Thursday, February 3 and 4, during their religion course.

Current sophomores (Class of 2023) – Wednesday and Thursday, February 10 and 11, during their religion course.



Don't Tempt Fate Don't Be Late

Seven Reasons to Submit Your College Application Sooner, Not Later

A college application deadline is not the same as the deadline for a high school paper or project. For starters, the college application deadline is nonnegotiable; if you miss the deadline, you miss your opportunity of acceptance. Here are some reasons students shouldn't wait to submit their college applications:

- 1. Peak Performance. When you're not rushed, you have time to do your best work.
- Holidays. The most common Regular
 Decision deadline is January 1, However,
 most admissions offices close for
 Thanksgiving and the winter holidays, and
 many use up vacation days in December.
 This means that if you have a question,
 someone may not be there to answer it.
- 3. Disasters. Hurricanes, floods, fires, earthquakes and other natural disasters have all occurred close to and during deadlines. Preparations for these events as well as the after-effects may prevent you from submitting. Some schools may extend the deadlines, but others keep theirs in place.
- Technological trouble. Blackouts happen.
 The Internet can go down. Websites have
 technical glitches. The Common App website
 crashed in 2013 and 2017. Application
 websites are also known to be very slow
 when there are large spikes in activity
 (usually around deadlines).
- 5. College bias. Most colleges document when students submit their applications. The document includes both the day and the time. If a student submits on the last day, the admission committee may think the student is not organized or not as interested as a student who applied early.
- 6. Housing and other perks. At a few colleges, such as University of Florida, after students submit their application, they can apply for campus housing. Students who apply early and then submit their nonrefundable housing deposit will have access to more (and better) housing options.
- 7. More stress. This should be self-explanatory. Save yourself, your parents, and your ICC advisor the stress! Getting all of your applications in early ensures you did your best work, and it feels amazing!



Fast Changing Sports Scene

The guidance around youth sports in California continues to change and be re-evaluated but we offer these key takeaways from the most recent update:

- The California Department of Health (CDH) anticipates making more announcements on Jan. 4.
- As of right now, Jan. 25 will be the first potential date for a start of new sport seasons.
- A return to play will be tied into our county's color tier status.
- Based on the CDH's announcement, it looks like cross-country, golf, tennis, swim, and track will be the first sports to gain clearance.
- Should cases go down and the vaccine continues to work and be distributed, other sports will also begin to
 receive clearances. Baseball sounds like the next sport to be likely to return, followed by most of our other sports
 after that.
- It's impossible to tell at this point in time what that means for us if football, soccer, lacrosse, and rugby. Indoor contact sports (basketball, wrestling, and volleyball) will have the biggest hurdles to clear.
- Spectators will likely be limited to immediate family only.
- Anticipate your athletes having to practice and compete in masks and/or face coverings.

MODERATE

Sports allowed in this tier: Badminton, Football, Gymnastics, Boys Lacrosse, Soccer, Volleyball, and Water Polo.

MINIMAL

Sports allowed in this tier: Basketball, Cheerleading, and Wrestling.

Physical conditioning, practice, skill building, and training that can be conducted outdoors, with 6-feet of physical distancing, and within stable team cohorts are currently authorized for all sports regardless of county tier status. Such activities may be conducted indoors consistent with the Gym & Fitness Center Guidance Capacity. In counties under the Regional Stay at Home Order, only activities consistent with the sentence above are permitted, regardless of the county's tier status.

Competition between two teams will not be allowed in California until January 25, 2021, at the earliest. Once return to competition is allowed every participating school's county must also be in the authorized tier status for the respective sport in order to compete.

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Listed here are just some of the many ways the schools' faculty and staff responded to the challenges 2020 have thrust upon us:

- Academics we embraced a hybrid learning schedule, created safely distanced classrooms, outdoor study cohorts, redesigned lessons, online learning/teaching, limited group work and one-way traffic in hallways and developed new supervision schedules.
- Athletics employed sanitizing protocols in the weight room, conducted athletic camps in cohorts, and everchanging guidance on CIF sports.
- Campus Ministry began hosting outdoor masses, Facebook mass, redesigned retreats, expanded training for retreat leaders.
- Arts drama students joined efforts with the film club to produce a Saints first, a full-length TV comedy "the Office", the

- band moved its traditional Christmas Concert outdoors.
- Intramurals We abandoned football, basketball, and dodgeball intramurals in favor of cornhole, golf and ping pong.
- Fundraising Video messages from the President for new parent gatherings, and a days' worth of alumni video appeals on Giving Tuesday.
- Admissions New Family orientations conducted virtually, a variety of Virtual Admissions presentation to replace our 8th grade visits and Open House, creation of a series of one-minute videos to engage prospective students.
- ASB & student activities Creation of an activities calendar that included costume contests, Rooftop Pumpkin Drops, Frozen Turkey Bowling, the Turkey Trot Relays, Hallway Wars (decorating for Halloween and Christmas) and the lunchtime wiffleball Homerun Derby to name a few.

- Counseling Establishment of a Counseling YouTube channel to communicate with students and families about college apps, SCOIR, and financial aid.
- Support staff these dedicated saints staffers became purveyors of health records, liaisons with county health officials, temperature screeners, and the providers of hospitality in conditions that are simply inhospitable.
- Austin Parent Association providing video messages to parents by grade level and supporting the faculty with an appreciation lunch in November.

With the vaccine on the horizon, we all yearn for a return to normal. But the pandemic has provided some hope and a whole lot of affirmation. With a can-do attitude, a strong belief in the Augustinian Mission of the school and some creative thinking we can work around most challenges and forever keep the Saint Experience alive.

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most importantly, are excited when their students are learning. For the teacher it is not enough to like learning and books—a great teacher is inspired by their students and is motivated to see them succeed.

Typically, teachers earn a teaching credential and/or a Master's Degree in Education or in their subject area to improve their teaching practice. While these programs have the potential of improving teaching, many times changes in teacher practice cannot be seen. The programs are theoretical and taught by professors who in most cases have never taught in a high school classroom.

In June, after Saints had been online since March 16, 2020, a goal surfaced from the administrative team that is worthy of a more thorough discussion. As our practice has been for over a decade, each June the administrative staff evaluates our progress on last year's goals and then establishes new goals for the coming year. It was in this evaluation process that a goal was approved to capture all that had been learned during the online learning process last spring.

Thinking back to my teaching days in the early 1970s, our educational tools were limited. There was a blackboard, textbooks, pen and paper, a projector for celluloid films (they had to be rented), an overhead projector, a typewriter, a library, a mimeograph machine for making copies of testing materials and hopefully an inspiring teacher. In this almost static system, teachers generally taught as they were taught.

This was how it was for years until the advent of the computer. With the coming of this machine, the teaching process began to evolve slowly into a much more sophisticated enterprise. As the internet became a more potent force around the world, it also began to affect the classroom, libraries and teaching practices. While older teachers generally taught as they always had, newer teachers more fully embraced the idea of bringing the world into the classroom through technology.

When Saints went online March 16, the potential for the biggest change in educational practice since the advent of the blackboard was about to begin. No one fully understood that an opportunity was standing right in front of us. On that day, an early morning teacher's meeting was called by Jim Horne, the principal. As the faculty gathered in the library to discover what was going to happen next, no one really understood what the next 10 weeks would look like.

As Mr. Horne addressed the faculty, there was not a sound except for his voice. He spoke about the need for the entire school to go online and this event would occur later in the morning. Words like "pivot" and Zoom were used to explain the next rendition of Saints.

Some of the teachers had no idea how this was going to work for them. There was terror in the hearts of some of the teachers as they realized, the teaching world had been turned upside down and what was comfortable and normal would no longer be the teaching environment at Saints. Technology was the only answer to solve the dilemma they were facing.

It was interesting how the strength of the Saints Community kicked-in during the meeting. Teachers began volunteering to help other teachers understand different apps that would be helpful to the teaching process. Some Saints teachers were ready for this change, while others had to learn on the job. Little did anyone know the learning that took place that morning was the beginning of a nine-month in-service that would change and improve the delivery of curriculum at Saints.

The ship left its moorings that morning, and everyone was on board. It was our sense of community and friendship that moved Saints forward so successfully. When the administration, teachers and staff love and respect each other with a Board of Directors and the Augustinians supporting their efforts, the ship sails in calm waters.

This learning process continued throughout the spring with teachers and students learning together through this new medium of technology. Although many of these newly attained skills propelled our faculty through the spring, it also provided teachers with more teaching options that could be used in conjunction with in-person learning once we returned to that mode of education. As we discovered, using technology alone without live student/teacher interaction was flat for most students, these same skills applied to an in-person setting, exposed the student to a deeper, more interesting learning experience that added a richness to instruction.

The pandemic has strengthened the Saints Community. Our skills as educators have been improved, and our intention of creating friendships with our students is no longer theoretical. We now know from our experience and from teaching our young men face-to-face this fall that Saints is thriving in a more evolved manner.

New Year's Thoughts From Chaplain Max



Be Courteous to Our Neighbors

Park on Campus When You Can

Parents who drive to campus and in the neighborhoods near school can play an important role in enhancing safety near Saints by following safe driving practices. They also can help Saints be a good neighbor in our community. When we return to School please pay attention to the helpful tips below.

Dropping your son off away from school and allowing him to walk a few blocks will prevent large gathering at entrances. Have a designated pick up spot where your student can meet you after school while social distancing himself from others. This will help prevent student gathering in crowds as they arrive and leave school. You have healthy young men who can walk a short distance to and from campus.

- Avoid double parking
- Only travel on the right side of the street
- Use the turnouts and avoid stopping on streets immediately surrounding school (32nd, 33rd, Nutmeg and Palm)
- Do not block driveways
- Make no U-Turns on Nutmeg St.
- Drive slowly in the neighborhood 25 mph, and even slower at drop-off (7:30 am) and pick -up (2:00 pm) times.
- Slow down and obey all traffic laws and speed limits, in neighborhoods surrounding the school.
- Watch for students walking or bicycling (both on the road and the sidewalk) in areas near a school.
- If you are on campus for an after school or evening event please park in the lower parking lot to allow neighbors to park in front of their houses.
