## Following a time-honored tradition, the school proudly announces its Austin Scholars for 2022.

The "Austins" are rigorous oral examinations in English, mathematics, religion, science, social studies, and visual and performing arts. The exam also assesses the participants' understanding of the Integral Student Outcomes. News was recently released naming the 2021-2022 seniors who were invited to sit for this school year's Austin Exams.

The senior with the highest weighted academic cumulative grade point average at the conclusion of the seventh semester (P.E. excluded) is automatically invited to sit for the Austins. The remaining students, normally five, are selected by the Academic Council from the top 10% of the graduating class. The chairpersons of the academic departments represented in the Austins recommend graduation with specific academic distinctions for participants. The administration ratifies these recommendations. The specific academic distinctions include: Austin Scholar Summa Cum Laude (with highest praise) Austin Scholar Magna Cum Laude (with great praise) Austin Scholar Cum Laude (with praise).

Nearly 100 high school student body presidents were honored recently at the 65th annual Washington-Lincoln Laurels for Leaders luncheon, held at Montezuma Hall at San Diego State University. Saints ASB President Lucas Wurst represented the school.

"We love to see Saintsmen participate in civic/community events like Laurels for Leaders," says James Horne, Principal, St. Augustine High. "This is a remarkable event because of how many young San Diegans each ASB president represents."

The students, all seniors from San Diego County schools, were honored for their work to boost morale and engagement at their schools.

#### **BASEBALL**

Boasting five Division I commits, the Saints Baseball team entered the season as a top ten team in San Diego. So far, they have lived up to the hype, reeling off dominant wins in the Bill Whittaker Classic versus Mission Bay, University City, and Chula Vista. Additionally, they tied San Marcos 11-11 after it got too dark to finish the game in what has emerged as a candidate for game of the year. The two teams rematched in the championship game, which Saints dominated 9-3 behind a strong two-way effort from Cade Martinez, who pitched four innings of one-run ball and smoked a 3-RBI double to open the scoring. Senior Trevor Fox, junior Frankie Giacalone, and sophomore Justin Heffler each had two hits.



#### TRACK

Coming off three consecutive Western League titles, the track team aims to secure a fourth this season. With Coach Ryan Segura, the new head coach, and other new faces like Coach Jessica Brophy and former Saints sprinting champion Justice Gross ('21) the track team is bringing a whole new game plan to tackle the various events. The distance runners will lead the way again, with Senior Michael Butcher and Juniors Nate Wilson and Jimmy Markowicz pacing the team. In the sprints, the team will lean heavily on Josh Morgan ('22) and Chris Valderrama ('23). Anticipate a monster season out of superstar high jumper Nick Watson, who is drawing interest from colleges. Meanwhile, Senior Roman Ramirez will lead the throwers in the discus and shot put on the field.



#### **GOLF**

The golf season is teeing off with the team ready to come back stronger than ever. Having most of their returning stars from last year, they hope to compete for the CIF title. Young superstar Billy Davis [Year], reigning Western League Player of the Year and San Diego City League Match Play champion, is ready to dominate and show what he can bring to the table. Others like Senior Jacob Paule and Sophomore Santiago Garza also are ready to prove themselves and hopefully place in the competitive San Diego League Match Play and keep the trophy for the third year in a row.



#### LACROSSE

The Lacrosse team is prepared and equipped to battle for the CIF title this year. Stars like senior Will Tobias and Juniors Jack Elgas and Anthony Ivanjack are verifying their status as elite players and giving a push to the hopeful team. They hope to claim the Lacrosse crown by besting their rivals from up north. The team has a bright future, with many promising underclassmen, so they will not be counted out of any competition.



#### **SWIM**

Led by Senior Steven Coons and Junior Elijah Walulik, the Swim team anticipates being strong contenders in their upcoming season. #### **VOLLEYBALL**

The Saints Volleyball team entered this season with only four returning players and six underclassmen. After two tough losses to Grossmont and Madison, 3-2 and 3-1, respectively, the young team toppled a highly ranked Bishops team in a resounding 3-0 victory. It was a win fueled by rage—the Bishops team had mockingly sung the Saints alma mater prior to the game. The Saints volleyball team then followed that performance with wins over Coronado 3-1 and a resounding 3-0 victory over north county powerhouse Mission Hills. The team has three freshmen as starters and is led by team captains Senior Bodie Kerr and Junior Patrick O'Leary—Kerr and O'Leary have a combined 116 kills through the first three games. The Saints were able to capitalize on their three-game win streak by securing a spot in the gold division of the prestigious Beach Cities Invitational tournament for the first time in ten years with convincing victories over Nevada's top-rated Green Valley (2-1) and a sweep of Rancho Bernardo (2-0). The Saints fought point-for-point but fell in day two of the tournament to perennial open division powers Sage Creek and Westview. The Saints begin league play on March 22 against rival La Jolla High School as they look to position themselves for a top seed in the CIF SDS playoffs in May.



#### **TENNIS**

Fresh off the only coed tennis title in CIF history, Saints Tennis is aiming to win one on their own this year. Team leaders Seniors Tommy Gilcrest and Gabriel Casta are bringing their skills to the court ready to dominate any foe they face, while young players such as Mario Garcia pack a powerful punch. They are red-hot to start their season, running their record to 6-0 while beating up on the likes of Francis Parker, University City, and Santana.

benefit from this structure.

During the 1990's many leaders in all-boys schools felt their schools did provide a superior education to the co-educational model even though there was little research to support this position. Out of many conversations between all-boys schools on the east coast between Presidents and Principals of all-boys schools, it was decided there was a need to form an organization to support boys and primary research in how boys learn best —the International Boys' School Coalition (IBSC) was launched.

Nancy Caine, the Saints College Counselor at the time, heard about the organization and strongly felt it fit Saints. She began attending their annual conferences with some of our teachers and in no time she was appointed to their Board of Trustees. When she termed off the Board, I received her seat. The conferences were enriching and from the beginning, Saints began benefitting from the expertise found from around the world. It was during this time, I met Dr. Abigail James who became interested in the coalition due to better understanding her son's special learning needs and from her work in an all-boys school on the east coast.

For the past decade, Dr. James has collaborated with Saints. Every few years she flies out for the day and presents to the Saints Community the latest research about how boys learn best. This relationship has propelled Saints to the forefront of boys education on the west coast.

In Dr. James' latest meeting with the Saints faculty on March 14, she described the circumstances for boys as a world that is on a downward slide. The current statistics are alarming for any parent with a boy. According to the latest research, 40% of college students are currently male, more men ages 18 to 34 are currently living with their parents than out on their own and median wages for men have steadily decreased since the 1990s. Increasingly, boys are also more prone to depression and suicide.

On a positive note, she stated to me prior to her presentation, that Saints has paid attention to the latest research through the years, has incorporated it into our teaching strategies, and has developed one of the truly outstanding all-boys schools in the nation. From her experience, it is obvious that boys love Saints and is a motivating story about boys succeeding.

In her remarks, she lamented that boys are less ready for school than girls due to boys poor language acquisition skills and phonemic awareness. In many school settings, students are required to sit quietly at their desks for long periods of time during class. Research has demonstrated girls have the ability to tolerate this type of class far better than boys. Instruction that is primarily auditory with limited visuals and little experiential learning makes learning for most boys marginal. Without much movement in class, most boys suffer.

Dr. James pointed out that boys more than girls suffer memory issues with words and have more hearing issues. Some researchers believe hearing issues are a fundamental reason for boys lagging behind girls in reading, writing and vocabulary development.

The Saints faculty was reminded of boys' natural inquisitiveness, their need to know how things work, competitive nature, strong desire to solve problems, need to please and need for support when concepts become abstract and difficult.

James also emphasized boys strong relational needs to be part of a group. She noted acceptance by other boys and their teachers helps their developing self-confidence and sense of well-being. They need to know their teachers care about them and their parents love them.

It was heartening to know there is a growing body of research that is equipping our teachers with stronger teaching tools and a greater understanding of learning theory and its practical application as it relates to boys. Workshops such as the one Dr. James gave this March at Saints reminds us of the special nature of boys and the strategies that bring them through their adolescent years prepared for a productive life.



## Chaplain's Corner **Preparing For New Life**

During the Ash Wednesday service at our school Mass this year, I was reminded of a professor in the seminary who would tell us, "You must die, before you die, so that when you die, there is not much left of you to die."

Lent is a season of dying because it is a season of preparation for new life. We should note that this death is not a "negative" death, but rather the death of that which takes us away from ourselves.

This is because Lent is not meant to be a season of gloominess and misery—as we often mistake it to be. Even Pope Francis has remarked that we fool ourselves into being a perpetual Church of Lenten suffering—rather than one of Easter joy! In our own lives, we are often mistaken into thinking that we are chained to the bonds which bind us. Ironically however it is often the opposite—we grasp the chains of our oppression ourselves. It is in this way that we are called in this season of Lent to "letting go". Letting go of the chains of our false self and the false masks which we wear- in order that our true self may be born anew.

In this way, may the ashes of Lent make for a fertile ground to allow for the re-birth of each of us. That we might live with deeper integrity and a deeper authenticity as the man or woman whom God has created each of us to be. In doing this, we will truly find Easter joy.
