FAFSA REPROCESSING COULD TAKE WEEKS

The Education Department has begun reprocessing some student aid forms affected by calculation errors, undersecretary of education James Kvaal said. The department has also started sending corrected versions to colleges, but Kvaal said others could take weeks longer to begin reprocessing.

In the past few weeks, FAFSA processing has been beset by two major discoveries: <u>student aid index</u> <u>calculation errors</u>, which affected about 200,000 forms, and <u>incorrect tax data</u> provided by the IRS on about 330,000 forms. Combined, the errors meant nearly 20 percent of submitted FAFSAs would have to be reprocessed.

The department will reprocess all the affected forms, and has made headway on the first batch. But reprocessing those affected by tax errors is more complicated, a spokesperson said, and requires technical alterations to their systems. It is "on track" to begin reprocessing those

Kvaal said forms marred by student or contributor errors—about 16 percent of all submitted FAFSAs, a <u>much higher rate</u> than most years are steadily being corrected, and that students can and should log back into the system to fix them as soon as possible. Two-thirds of those rejected forms are simply missing consent to retrieve tax data, a mistake Kvall said should only take minutes to correct.

"This is a challenging year, and we're not at a point we want to be at," he said. "We know how important this is, and how hard these delays have been for students and families."

- · Does the college offer extracurricular activities of interest to me?
- What housing options are available?
- What are retention rates for first-year students?
- What are the graduation rates?
- What are the graduation rates for students by income level?
- What are job placement rates for students in my intended major?

YOUNG WOMEN IN STEM SCHOLARSHIP

Arizona Governor Katie

Email invitations for the "Bright Beginnings" program (used to be called "Count Me In") at **UC Merced** have been sent out. The invited students are the top 9% of California high school seniors who were not admitted to any of the UC campuses where they have applied. Students can use **free scholarship** matching services to search for the awards. Some of popular services include <u>Fastweb</u> and the <u>College Board's Big</u> <u>Future</u>.

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Recently, the SAT has undergone some significant changes. As of this year, the SAT has moved to a new digital format. This shift brings both advantages and challenges. This week's blog is written by our expert college advisor, Mary Simon. In addition to guiding students throughout the college admissions process, she served as a testing coordinator and proctor for the in-school SAT exams and knows about the stress, nuances, and importance of these tests.

Advantages of the New Digital SAT

- Faster score reporting
- Enhanced security measures
- · Reduced testing time from 3 to 2 hours
- · Shortened reading passages in the Reading section
- Calculator use allowed for the entirety of the Math section
- Greater accessibility for students with disabilities, including built-in adaptations such as a zoom feature to access large print, speech-to-text capabilities, and even a refreshable braille display for students who need these accommodations.

However, this new format presents its own set of challenges. Students taking the new Digital SAT have to adapt to its new format, which is much different than students are used to.

Challenges of the New Digital SAT

- An algorithm adjusts the difficulty of the test questions in the second half based on the student's performance in the first half
- Increased anxiety due to unfamiliarity with the new format
- · Limited resources for preparing for the new format
- Navigating the technical issues that may arise during digital testing

Recent ACT Updates

ACT has also recently announced some major changes, including the formation of a new partnership with Nexus Capital Management LP and a transition from a nonprofit entity to a for-profit institution. Along with this change, they are beginning to roll out a new pilot program that offers a shorter, digital testing option. This will be an option as early as the June 2024 testing date. This change is in addition to the new digital testing format that they already rolled out at select locations on the February 2024 test date. Currently, ACT offers the paper and pencil version as well as the newer digital format. We expect to see more changes and updates as they embark on this new path.



Consider aspects such as academic programs, location, campus culture, extracurricular opportunities, financial aid, and overall fit.

Make a Pros and Cons List

Create a pros and cons list for each college based on your priorities. This exercise can help you visualize the strengths and weaknesses of each option and clarify your thoughts. Visit the Campuses

Whenever possible, visit the campuses of the colleges you are considering either on admitted students day or another convenient time. A campus visit can provide



valuable insights into the atmosphere, community, and facilities. Take a campus tour, attend information sessions, sit in on classes if permitted, and interact with current students and faculty members. Pay attention to your gut feelings and how comfortable you feel on each campus.

The college visits after my daughter was admitted served to eliminate colleges on her list and solidify the one she finally chose.

Consider Financial Aid Packages

Evaluate the financial aid packages offered by each college carefully. Compare tuition costs, scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study opportunities. Consider the long-term financial implications of attending each college and how it aligns with your financial goals and obligations. Keep in mind that the cheapest option may not always be the best choice if it doesn't meet your other criteria.

Consult with Trusted Advisors
